ACTIVITY:

Blow bubbles for your baby to enhance his developing visual and motor skills. If you aim bubbles at a soft cloth or carpet, the bubbles will stick longer and give older infants time to catch them.





BABY SIGN LANGUAGE

This Month's Baby Signs are "BROTHER" & "SISTER."

To sign the word "brother," make both hands into an "L" shape. Hold one hand down by your chest and place the other hand at your forehead. Bring your top hand down to meet your lower hand. To sign the word "sister," make the same motion as "brother," but place your one hand at your chin and the other in front of your chest. For further assistance, have your child's teacher show you how to make the baby sign, or refer to videos and articles on the Web.

In our infant program, we start using baby sign language from the earliest months. Baby signs are common terms that have been modified and simplified from American Sign Language. As your baby reaches approximately six to eight months of age, he will begin to recognize and perhaps sign back to you on his own.

Baby signs are a good way to help children express themselves and lessen frustration in the early stages of language development. Signing helps young children learn to recognize, and eventually verbalize, the word associated with the sign.

Signing with your child is fun. Say the word as you sign. You can sign while holding your baby, and have him feel the sign that you are making. Baths and diaper changes are great times to practice baby signs.



Your child's teacher will take a purposeful approach to model, nurture and provide opportunities for growth in these Links to Learning skill areas.
