Links to Home: Shared Activities for Parents & Children

Problem-solving is an essential life skill that is developed at a young age. Stimulating your child's curiosity will motivate her to find solutions to everyday puzzles.

Here are some problem-solving activities that you can do with your child:

- Hide a sound-making toy, such as a rattle, music box or bell, behind your back. Let your child listen to the sound of the toy for a few seconds, without seeing it. See if she will go around you to find the toy. Give the toy to your child to play with before hiding it again.
- As your child watches, drop a piece of cereal into a small plastic bottle. Dump the cereal back out into your hand. Put the cereal back in the bottle again and hand it to your child. Let her try to get the cereal out. If she becomes frustrated, help her turn her wrist to dump out the cereal.
- Give your child a set of three to five nesting blocks. Show her how to stack them on top of each other and how to fit them inside each other. Let your child play and explore. Talk about the blocks as she stacks them or tries to nest them.

Wellness

Gross Motor Skills and Balance

- Dumps large containers
- Catches a ball rolled from a short distance
- Walks backwards
- Turns around
- Seats self and maintains balance in a child-sized chair
- Steps on or kicks ball in attempt to engage in kicking behavior

Fine Motor Skills

- Pulls apart and pushes pop beads back together
- Uses a large cup to scoop material
- Manipulates Play-Doh through squeezing and pounding
- Imitates motions of finger play
- Pull up large zippers
- Stacks 3-4 rings on a stick
- Uses hands together to complete fine motor tasks

Health, Safety and Nutrition

- Holds railing going up or down stairs
- Gets a tissue when prompted

Gross Motor Skills and Balance

- Jumps in place with two feet
- Runs
- Climbs steps independently
- Throws a ball forward
- Sits upright on floor with legs crisscrossed
- Fills and dumps containers

Fine Motor Skills

- Puts large pegs in a peg board
- Places blocks in a row
- Strings large beads
- Turns large knobs
- Builds a tower of 4 or more blocks
- Lifts lids from large containers

Health, Safety and Nutrition

- Climbs playground stairs holding the railing
- Sits and stands from child-sized chair without falling
