Links to Home: Shared Activities for Parents & Children

This month, your child will learn to differentiate between numbers and letters, repeat patterns of three, and identify personal characteristics.

Here are some suggested activities to practice these skills with your child.

- Take a walk outdoors with your child. Point to letters and numbers on street signs and ask your child questions. "What letter is that?", "What number is that?" or "Is that a number or a letter?"
- Prompt your child to talk about himself by using personal characteristics. "What color is your hair?" or "What color are your eyes?"
- Clap a simple pattern for your child and see if he can repeat it.
 Try several different patterns. If your child is able, let him clap a pattern for you to follow.
