
Dress Up as Your Favorite Character

Culture Month

Dear Parents,

We have been learning about families and celebrations from The United States of America, as well as other countries and cultures. In the next couple of weeks, students will be exploring their own cultures as a special class project. As a culminating activity, students will have Culture Day on Friday, April 15th. The cultural projects from students' research will go on display in the classroom and you will be able to take a tour of our exhibits.

Now here comes the fun part! Food of course! On Culture Day, students are requested to bring in one food dish representative of their own culture. Please make sure that the dish does not need refrigeration and that it comes in a disposable tin/tray. Come prepared to enjoy food from different cultures and to learn about others in an engaging and exciting way. Here is a timeline of our projects so you and your child can be fully prepared:

<u>1st Week of April</u>- Students will do research in class about their culture and bring notes home to include in their assignments. Please send artifacts, costumes, instruments, ethnic artwork, and crafts that you may have around your home. Do not buy anything special!

Let's Celebrate Holi on April 17th, 2022

Holi is a popular ancient Hindu festival, also known as the "Festival of Love", the "Festival of Colors" and the "Festival of Spring". In the festival celebrates the eternal and divine love of Radha Krishna. Holi celebrates the arrival of spring, the end of winter, the blossoming of love and for many, it is a festive day to meet others, play and laugh, forget and forgive, and repair broken relationships. The festival also celebrates the beginning of a good spring harvest season. Like many festivals, Holi is celebrated differently by people of different faiths and backgrounds. What remains the same is the warmth and the spirit of this day.

Preparing for Holi

Choose your outfit.

On the day of the Holi celebration, people celebrate the end of winter and the coming of spring by showering each other with brightly colored powder and water. We will buy gulal (colored powder), which is a natural red-orange color made from the flowers of palash. The flowers are dried and ground to create a powdered color. We will also buy abeer, which is small crystal chips of mica that create a sparkly silver color. People frequently combine the two to create a fun red-orange sparkly colored powder.

- Red, pink, yellow, green and violet are the most used colors.
- Try a test patch on your wrist to check you aren't allergic to the chemicals in the colored powder, especially if you are celebrating it







- for the first time. If you have sensitive skin or skin issues, we will buy organic colors that don't cause redness or itchiness.
- There are colors available that are made from rice flour and natural colorings. Look online to buy Holi colors for the festival.
- Spray colored water with pichkaris. A pichkari is a water gun to squirt colored water from as a fun way to celebrate Holi. Mix some of the colored powder with water and then add it to the pichkari. Use the pichkari to cover people with colored water and enjoy playing in the bright colors.





- 1. Please provide a <u>dozen plastic eggs</u> filled with individually wrapped soft and nut-free <u>candies or chocolates</u>.
- 2. Please give these eggs to the teachers on or before April 12th.
- 3. Please provide an Easter basket for your child to put the eggs.
